Classes: 09.00 am to 5.00 pm. with a short lunch break, plus two additional activities in the evening.

Aim: The aim of this Summer School is to introduce the students to the complexity of border management in international politics.

Teaching methodology: The Summer School will follow a simulation-based methodology. Facing the scenario of several migratory crises over the world, -fictionally- the United Nations General Secretary has appointed different teams of six rapporteurs to be sent to five specific locations to produce an analytic report of the situation. One of these teams will be sent to Cádiz. During their stay in Spain, they will be spectators of a migratory crisis and the different events that will occur in the following days.

The crisis will be triggered by a migrants' crisis in Northern Africa, which will help the students to understand the complexities of the management of borders in different dimension: i) bilateral relations, ii) relations and role of the EU, iii) security challenges, iv) role of the United States in the area, and v) humanitarian and human rights crisis.

The program is composed of different teaching/learning methodologies: lectures, online work with practitioners, oral briefings, and group work. The use of teamwork dynamics, contact with practitioners and briefing activities as well as real decision makers will enhance some fundamental skills for students.

Dynamic: Students will receive information from experts on the different issues involved in crisis management. These experts will come from different sectors: Academia, police forces, politics, Public Administration... Every morning and every evening they will receive an update of how the crisis is evolving. Those events will be synchronized with the theoretical sessions.

Learning objectives:

- To give students the opportunity to apply the theoretical content they have acquired during the Master's program and also during the Summer School.
- To gain knowledge about a specific geographical area and the complexity of border security.
- To gain soft skills such as memo writing, briefing, leadership and information processing.

Learning skills:

- To brief policy makers/decision makers
- To elaborate memos about the topics of the Summer School

Evaluation:

Active class participation and involvement in the activities 30%

Final group briefing 50%

Individual video briefing 20%

Grading system: Spanish. Pass-Fail

Structure of the report: I. The Problem. II. How the crisis/situation has been managed, III. Challenges, IV Human Rights, V. Recommendations. VI Personal opinion (separate document) The full structure will be provided via Slack.

Last day the three groups will brief two policymakers and they will receive from them their comments and final remarks. The consolidated version of the final report will be video individually recorded by all students and they will receive feedback from a communication expert.

Length: Maximum 7 pages (4000-4500 words)

Daily work load: 6 hour per day

Max. Autonomous student workload: 1 hour/day

Sessions: During the theoretical classes it will be delivered the basic contents for understanding the fictitious crisis and the events that will occur during the day.

Work in groups. Students will be permanently assisted by at least two members of the Summer School (Lorena, Beatriz, Cristina, Antonio) to provide them guidance and support. It is expected that most of the report would be prepared during these sessions.
